Improving Water Security in Nepal Agendas for Research, Policy and Practice

Addressing water security is one of the most serious challenges facing countries like Nepal. Efforts in research, policy and practice surrounding water security are underway—but important questions still remain to be understood and addressed. In particular, Nepal lacks effective institutions and decision systems to address the growing uncertainties and risks on water availability, variability, and to clarify the roles of the state and non-state actors. These problems become more complex in the context of growing urbanization, climate change, and persistence of social inequity and conflict at various scales, and weak state capacityin rural areas. At the same time, there is considerable potential at a grassroots level to address water security challenges through local informal institutions.

This consultation has been hosted by Southasia Institute of Advanced Studies (SIAS) in collaboration with International Water Management Institute (IWMI) in order to arrive at common themes and action points to guide research, policy and practice around water security, especially focusing on the poor and marginalized groups. It is anticipated that there will be active participation from relevant actors concerned with irrigation, hydropower, drinking water and sanitation sectors in Nepal.
