We encourage articles which record the results of completed investigations and raise questions emerging from on-going work.

## Articles must subscribe to the following format:

- 1. Research articles should be roughly 8500 words (excluding the references) and include an abstract of 250-300 words.
- 2. Opinion pieces can be between 2000-3000 words with summary of 100 to 150 words [key message].
- 3. Spelling should be in UK English.
- 4. Articles should be in an MS Word compatible format, with a font size of 10, and 1.5 line spacing.
- 5. Short quotations should use single quotation marks, while longer quotes should be indented with font size 9.
- 6. Photos can be included, but should be no more than 4x6 inches, and will be published in black and white.
